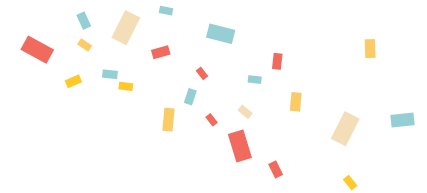

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FEATURED KEYNOTE

APRIL 18

Civil rights advocate and global humanitarian Martin Luther King III is shepherding the healing of our nation and the world, connecting the important lessons of the past with the critical needs of our future and motivating a new generation of authentic leaders.

As the oldest son of the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Mrs. Coretta Scott King, Martin Luther King III is a thought leader on the world stage, a peace maker, and a negotiator on some of today's most critical national and international platforms for social change. Amplifying the work of his father, Mr. King has devoted his life to promoting global human rights and eradicating racism, violence, and poverty — referred to by his father as the “triple evils” and the “scourges of humankind” — on every continent except Antarctica.

“I go to schools and ask kids what they are worried about, and too often, they say they are worried that someone will come into their school and shoot them,” Mr. King says. “We must focus on eradicating violence — not teaching our children to cope with it.”

Having been arrested in peaceful protests more than a dozen times, Mr. King's actions demonstrate his commitment to serving as an ambassador of social change. “Society has embraced a culture of violence,” he says, “but today's real leaders must think about how to create a culture of non-violence because our culture cannot sustain itself if we continue to operate this way.” An experienced and respected international statesman who has consulted with numerous heads of state and governments, his dedication to implementing strategic, nonviolent solutions to stop the rise of social, political, and economic injustice has built his reputation as one of the world's most passionate advocates for the poor and oppressed.

With the astounding display of social injustice and violence over the last several years, perhaps at no other time in recent history has our world needed the clear thinking and solutions-oriented voice of Mr. King. In August 2020, on the anniversary of his father's iconic “I Have a Dream” speech and in response to the Memorial Day death of George Floyd, Mr. King addressed thousands from the steps of the Lincoln Memorial during the “Get Your Knee Off Our Necks” March On Washington, urging the people who had traveled from across the country to continue Martin Luther King Jr.'s pursuit of racial equality.

In his trademark logical approach to problem-solving, Mr. King raises the public discourse on social issues and challenges us all to do better. “If we can live a day in peace, why can't we live a week in peace? If we can live a week in peace, why can't we live a month? If we can live a month, why not a year? And if we can achieve a year, why not a lifetime?”

They will be able to embrace learned principles and measure their leadership growth based on their level of influence with the people they lead through the five levels of leadership, which include position, permission, production, people development, and pinnacle, as well as be able to utilize tools to develop a growth plan for their next level of leadership. Introduction to Behavioral Health Integration ●①

Behavioral Health needs are highly prevalent and increasing. When an emotional, behavioral, and developmental concern arises, most families first seek the advice of their primary care clinician. Unfortunately, primary care clinicians report little training in behavioral health skills and limited time to address behavioral health concerns. Behavioral health integration within primary care is a promising innovation to help address these gaps in care. Studies have found that behavioral health integration can significantly increase access to care, reduce disparities in care, improve patient experience of care, increase provider satisfaction, and reduce healthcare costs. Integrated models are becoming more and more common in the medical and behavioral health fields as we learn about how the mind and body are connected. This workshop is designed to provide a brief introduction to integrated care including rationale for and impact of BHI, implementation models, effective components, adapting clinical interventions for the primary care setting, common ethical challenges, clinician self-care, and much more. Moving Youth from the Streets to Safety ●❖⌘④

Safety Net in Toledo and Huckleberry House in Columbus are two of Ohio's Runaway and Homeless Youth (RHY) Shelters offering 24 hour emergency shelter for youth 12-17 years old living on the streets or who are experiencing homelessness or are at risk for homelessness. The purpose of the RHY shelters is to provide temporary emergency shelter, educational life skills groups, counseling services, refer to other social services as needed and successfully discharge to safe and stable housing. In addition to providing a trauma-informed safe place for youth to stay, the shelters offer a hot meal and access to other basic necessities such as clothing and hygiene items. The intent of this mission is to increase young people's safety, social and emotional well-being, and self-sufficiency, provide pregnancy prevention and sexual education group services, and help them build permanent connections with families, communities, schools and other positive social networks. Both shelters coordinate care and collaborate with other child-serving systems (i.e. child welfare, juvenile justice, etc.) to ensure that youth are connected to their families or other caring adults, rather than further escalating into homelessness. Both shelters are funded through a variety of grants in addition to private donations. This workshop will elevate your awareness and knowledge of RHY shelter services offered in Ohio, how we are funded, how we operate, the populations served and collaboration necessary for holistic care coordination for this vulnerable population. Using data from GLSEN, participants will identify types of oppression (large and small) experienced by LGBTQ+ students in middle school and high school, creating connections where possible to the opening activity. Participants will center the idea that allyship is something that you do, not someone that you are, identify what makes allyship visible to youth, and start discussing various things professionals can do to make sure their spaces are affirming. **ROOM LOCATION: HOUSE**

Strategies for Recruiting Resource Families in Ohio - It Takes Heart Campaign™ ●■②③

Ohio Children's Alliance, on behalf of the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) is working to create and deploy a statewide marketing campaign to increase the number of qualified resource (foster and kinship) and adoptive families in the state. The campaign builds on the current It Takes Heart Ohio campaign launched in 2019, to increase awareness and address the statewide shortage of available resource families. Ohio Children's Alliance's Resource Home Recruitment staff is committed to working with all public and private agencies statewide to make the campaign a success. During this workshop, attendees can expect a brief overview of the foster care landscape (based on data provided by ODJFS) that has been analyzed to better understand the need for resource and adoptive families statewide. We combine this data with historical data and market research of foster and adoptive families over the last 5+ years, to define best practices for recruitment in Ohio. We will present these best practices, share ways for your agency to get involved, and answer any questions you may have about the overall Resource Home Recruitment Program, and the It Takes Heart Ohio campaign. **ROOM LOCATION: SENATE**

Treating Youth with Severe Behavioral Issues in the Home and Community with MST ●①

Learn about OhioRISE's care coordination process and what role you play. OhioRISE (Resilience through Integrated Systems and Excellence) is a specialized Medicaid managed care program that focuses on children and youth who have complex behavioral health and multisystem needs. The OhioRISE program covers behavioral healthcare services and supports, one of which is care coordination. Young people with multisystem needs often require educational, developmental disability, child protection, juvenile justice, and/or mental health and addiction supports. OhioRISE care coordination helps to bring all of these systems together with the youth and family at the center to support their needs. A WHOLE team approach sustains all goals and processes from service providers and other system partners alongside kids and families, working in concert and not fragmented. In this session you will learn about care coordination and ways you can support youth with complex behavioral health and multisystem needs in OhioRISE and how you can refer youth who may benefit from the program. **ROOM LOCATION: LEGISLATIVE**

Educational Stability for Students in Foster Care ♦●①

One of the best ways to support educational stability for students in foster care is to take a trauma-informed approach when working with these youth. Once a youth is identified as being in the foster care system, cross-system collaboration is important to supporting the youth. Minimizing the trauma of additional change, the Every Student Succeeds Act works to ensure youth have the same high level achievement of their peers. This workshop will focus on the basics of ESSA along with best practice supports for identified youth in foster care.

Introduction to Incorporating Motivational Interviewing as a Vital Component of Engagement ●②③

Motivational Interviewing (MI) is a guided style of communication child, youth and family-supporting professionals can utilize to increase opportunities for engagement. The skills in MI can also assist youth, parents or caregivers, and collateral partners in identifying reasons to and pathways toward change. These are not small tasks, and correlationally, Motivational Interviewing is no small skillset. This introduction (or refresher) will touch on broad aspects of MI, including: defining MI as a communication style that may be used on its own, or in combination with other interventions; the spirit of MI and how this foundation meshes well with child/youth services; skillsets; and engagement.

Technology Collaboration to Improve Foster Care Outcomes ●②③

Each organization will highlight their respective innovation strategies, sharing with participants key ways in which they can harness data to drive positive change at their own organizations. This session, which is designed to facilitate knowledge-sharing and dialogue, will illustrate that the effective use of technology and data can help agencies improve outcomes and make a meaningful impact on children and families. This session will explore ways in which technology that goes a step beyond compliance can reduce paper work, data entry, and redundant tasks to allow social workers to focus more on the needs of the youth and families in their care. It will also touch on how digital tools can provide real time data and insights for executive teams, and in turn allow them to make more informed decisions about what they are doing and why.

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ADVOCACY DAY KEYNOTE

Lt. Governor Jon Husted oversees the Ohio Common Sense Initiative (CSI) and serves as the Director of both the Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation and InnovateOhio.

Jon Husted started his life in a foster home before being adopted by his loving parents, Jim and Judy. He is the oldest of three children and was raised in Northwest Ohio's Williams County. The small community instilled in him the importance of faith, family, and hard work that serve as the foundation of his public service.

On November 6, 2018, Jon Husted was elected to serve as Lt. Governor of the State of Ohio. Husted also previously served as Ohio Secretary of State, Speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives, and a member of the Ohio Senate.

Throughout his term in elected office, Jon has demonstrated repeatedly his ability to get things done that have a positive impact on Ohio and its residents.

As Secretary of State, Jon made it his mission to make Ohio the best state in the Midwest to do business by improving customer services and reducing wait times for entrepreneurs. In 2017, Secretary Husted announced the efficiencies in his office had not only allowed him to cut the fees the state charged on Ohio entrepreneurs, but also eliminate the need for taxpayer funding for the government office entirely for the remainder of his term in office – a move that has saved taxpayers millions of dollars.

As House Speaker, Jon led the passage of the most conservative state budget in 40 years, which included at the time, the largest income tax cut in Ohio's history.

This specific recommendation is titled "Strengthen Relationships Between Birth Families and Foster Parents." This approach stems from a national initiative showing how collaborative relationships promote family engagement, sibling connections, and family preservation for children and teens placed in out-of-home care. The Crossover - Transition Planning for Multi-System Engaged Youth ●■2③

PRESENTER: *Danielle Green-Welch, Founder, Founder & Executive Director, M.Ed, Ed.S., DreamKeepers Programs*

This workshop examines how to develop a transition plan for multi-system youth, specifically youth in child welfare, juvenile justice and mental health systems. There are three primary learning objectives: 1) understand some universal barriers to cross-system collaborations and strategies to overcome them, 2) identify stakeholders in each system to support youth's transition and 3) understand the necessary components for an individualized youth transition plan. Participants will engage in discussion to identify the common barriers to working with the juvenile justice, child welfare and/or mental health systems to support youth across systems; and the importance of utilizing community-based resources to meet youth's needs and distribute service delivery.

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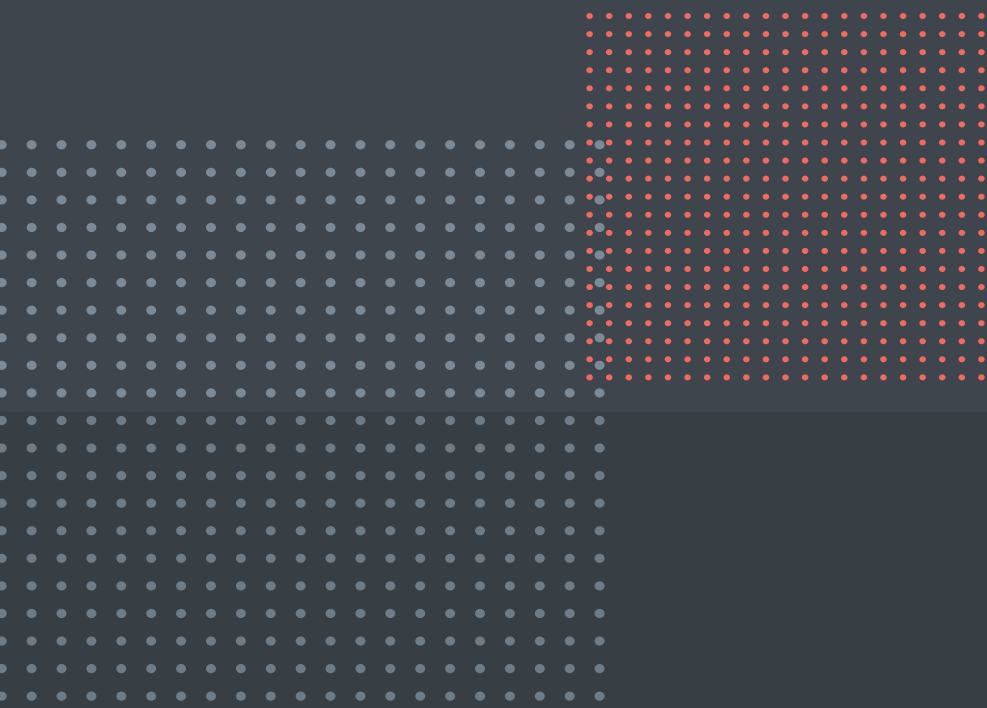
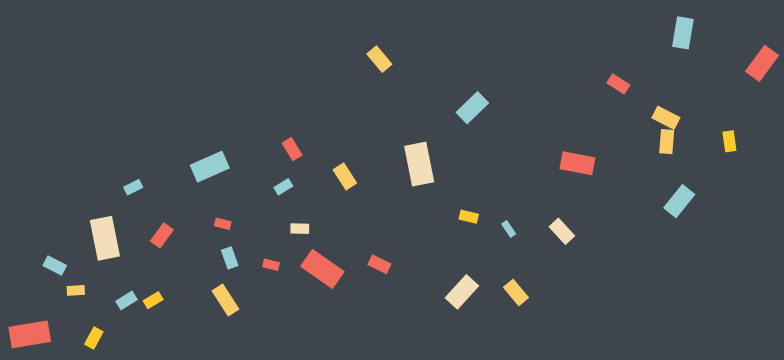
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
